sports. A truant from the rough streets of Harlem,
Althea emerged as a most unlikely queen of the highly
segregated tennis world in the 1950s. Her roots as a

to Harlem in the 1930s, mentoring from Sugar Ray
Robinson, David Dinkins and others, and fame that
thrust her unwillingly into the glare of the early Civil
Rights movement, all bring her story into a much
broader realm of the American story.
